Menominee County Fair Board reserves to itself authority to make such rules and Regulations governing the control and management of the fair as in its judgment may be necessary and proper to properly carry out the purposes for which said fair is being held. The Fair Board also reserves to itself the authority to establish what admission shall be charged.

The Menominee County Fair will use diligence to insure the safety of livestock and articles entered for exhibition or display after their arrival on the fair grounds. However, exhibitors of these articles or livestock will assume all risk other than that which may fall under the public liability and property damage coverage.

The Menominee County Fair reserves to itself the right to refuse, accept conditionally, and to cancel any entries and awards of prizes without claim for damages.

EXHIBITORS' PROCEDURES

The Menominee County Fair Manager reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and to settle and determine all matters, questions, or differences in regard thereto or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident to the operation of the Menominee County Fair.

By disregarding or violating any rules or regulations any exhibitor or contestant forfeits all premiums, rights and privileges without recourse and will be subject to such penalty as the Menominee County Fair Board may order. If doubt arises as to the meaning or application of a rule, the Manager shall interpret the same. Pre-entry is required on exhibits of dairy and beef cattle, goats, sheep, rabbits, poultry, riding horses, draft

horses, youth department, home economics, and fair queen/princess entries.

Closing date for pre-entry is July 6, 2016. Applications for pre-entry should be made on the printed form provided in the premium book for that purpose. Additional application forms may be obtained from the Fair Office or menomineecounty.com website. **A separate entry blank MUST be used for each department.** No additional entries accepted after pre-entry closing date. All pre-entries should be addressed to Menominee County Fair, S904 U.S. Highway 41, Stephenson, MI 49887.

All exhibits MUST be the work of the individual in whose name the exhibit is entered. **Pre-entry is required, for all events except Tractor and Truck Pull, Garden Tractor Pull, Horse and Pony Pull. Absolutely no registrations will be accepted after the deadline date of July 6, 2016**

JUNIOR SHOW RULES

1. Competition is open to any Menominee County resident who has not reached his or her 20th birthday before January 1st, 2016. Age of all members will be determined as of January 1st, 2016. Birth Certificate may be required for proof of age if there is a question or protest. **Birth Certificate is required for first time exhibitors (CLOVERBUDS).**
2. Rules: The junior exhibitor will abide by the general exhibitors' rules of the Menominee County Fair and any special rules set up in this Premium Book.
3. Requirements: Animals may be either grade or purebred unless otherwise designated. All animals must be owned for 30 days prior to entry and the exhibitor must feed, fit, groom, train and show the animal himself/herself. All animals must be trained to lead. Rope or leather halters may be used.
4. Identification: Animals must be identified by diagram, picture, or ear tag number; and it is the sole responsibility of the junior exhibitor to have the animal so identified and recorded on the Pre-entry blank.

Entry fees for all livestock, small animals, queen/princess contest, and horse shows MUST be sent with the pre-entry blanks. Entry fees for tractor pull, horse and pony pull, and 4 x 4 pull will be collected at time of weigh-in.

The department Superintendent will be responsible for stall and pen assignments for animals. All stalls and pens should be kept clean and well bedded.

No livestock will be housed on the fairground property prior to Thursday morning, July 21, 2016, without a special permit from the Fair Manager. Each exhibitor will provide all feed and bedding for their animals, unless otherwise stipulated by the Superintendent of each department.

Health requirements: The state veterinarian or his/her representative may inspect animals as they arrive on the grounds or at any time during the fair.

Substitutions of animals within the same class, entered for reasons satisfactory to the superintendent and with the approval of the Manager, will be permitted.

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Competition in all departments is open only to Menominee County residents with the exception of the tractor and truck pull, horse and pony pull, draft and miniature horse and donkey show.

The Superintendent will direct the calling of classes for judging in accordance with the printed program as far as practicable and will see the judge's report fully upon each animal or article exhibited in each class.

If there is any question as to the regularity of an entry or the right of any animal or article to compete in any class, the matter shall be submitted to the Superintendent in charge of that department for adjustment.

The decision of the judges shall be final, and no appeal will be considered except in the cases of protests to the Fair Manager. Objections to any person serving as a judge must be submitted to the superintendent in writing, *prior to making any award*, giving good and sufficient reasons therefore. The Superintendent shall refer this to the Manager who shall have full power to act.

Formal Protests: A formal protest by an agricultural exhibitor shall be made in writing to the Manager, accompanied by an affidavit setting forth the grounds for the protest. A formal protest against an agricultural exhibition of animals or articles shall be filed not less than 24 hours before judging. A formal protest against a placing shall be filed no more than six hours after the placing has been made, and shall be considered by the Manager. Interested parties shall be duly notified and given an opportunity to submit evidence pursuant to a procedure established by the Manager, before a final decision is made. In addition to the rights of protest herein guaranteed to interested parties, the Fair Board expressly reserves the right, within the scope or power of its authority, to take cognizance of any attempt at fraud, as may be found from the evidence relating hereto, and to act as may be deemed just and proper.

Awards: Judges' sheets will be used as sole evidence for payment of premiums. Ribbons and tags are not accepted.

An entry in any department, including an entry made under the Danish System of judging, does not guarantee a premium award.

THE MENOMINEE COUNTY FAIR BOARD RESERVES THE RIGHT TO PRO-RATE ALL PREMIUMS.

Fire regulations: Smoking will not be permitted in any exhibition buildings.

Animal rights activists may hand out literature only in designated area. Failure to comply will result in immediate removal from the premises.

Procedure for Filing A Complaint Or Appeal With the Fair
Exhibitors have 10 days from the close of the fair to file a complaint or appeal with the fair. The fair must define the steps for the board review, investigation and issuing a notice of finding and recommended actions. The exhibitor has 45 days from the date that the complaint was filed with the fair to file an appeal with the Department of Agriculture. The department has 60 days to investigate the appeal and issue a report on the findings.

Person wishing to file a complaint can pick up a form at the Fair Office at S904 US 41, Stephenson, MI 49887 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday. Return completed form to the Fair Office. A Fair Board of reviews meeting will be called to investigate the complaint and return recommended actions. If said person is not happy with the recommended actions, they can then file an appeal with the Department of Agriculture.

****All sheep and goats must have official USDA tag showing they have undergone testing for scrapplies. All cattle must provide evidence of negative testing for BVD PI and have RFID ear tags. RULES FOR THE DAIRY AND BEEF SHOW

1. BE SURE YOU ENTER YOUR ANIMALS IN THE RIGHT CLASS, ACCORDING TO THE AGE OF THE ANIMAL.
2. A \$10 entry fee will be charged for each entry.
3. All animals must be pre-registered. The entry fee must be paid at the time of pre-registration. No animal may be shown unless the

animal is pre-registered by July 6., 2016. No money will be accepted at the fairgrounds.

4. Only dairy and beef cattle from Menominee County are eligible to be exhibited.

5. Cattle will be shown according to their age, as determined by registration papers. Grades may use DHIA records to prove age of animals.

6. Each farm is limited to 10 entries, in addition to the Youth Department entries from the farm for dairy and beef.

7. Youth Department entrants may exhibit one animal per class in Open Class in addition to the other animals from that farm.

8. Dairy Herd Classes 20 & 21 must be made up from the animals from one farm, including Youth Department entries from the farm.

9. All animals must be identified by ear tag or tattoo.

10. Production premiums will be paid on the high DHIA or Owner-Sampler actual record certified by the DHIA supervisor. There will be a \$3 per cow entry fee, paid when the records are submitted.

11. Feed, water and bedding must be supplied by the exhibitor.

12. Only first place animals are eligible for Grand Champion.

13. First place animals are also eligible for Reserve Champion. The second place winner in the class from which the champion was selected should be brought into the ring for judging.

14. All decisions of the judge will be final. Premiums will be paid on the judge's placing of the animals.


15. Dairy Cattle should be brought to the fairgrounds between 9 and 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 23rd. They must remain on the grounds for viewing until 4 p.m. on Saturday afternoon.

16. Beef Cattle should be brought to the fairgrounds for registration on Friday, July 24th, from 8-4:00 p.m. Junior show members will exhibit according to their age as of January 1, 2016. Junior showmen may enter one animal per class.

17. Menominee County youth between the ages of 9 and 19 may enter the Youth Departments. **Ages 5-8 are eligible for Cloverbud Classes ONLY. Parents must accompany Cloverbud exhibitors.**

18. All 4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters, and any other youth groups may enter the group contests.



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RULES THAT APPLY TO SHEEP & GOAT SHOW

1. Sheep exhibits in the Youth Department are open to any Menominee County youth who has reached age 9 by January 1st, 2016 or has not reached his/her 20th birthday by January 1st, 2016, with the exception of any Cloverbud Youth Classes for ages 5 – 8.
 2. Junior Showmen may enter the same animal in both the Junior Show and Open Show. If a junior sheep exhibitor shows his/her animal in both the junior and open class, he or she must pay the entry fee in both departments.
 3. Exhibitor must furnish food and water.
 4. Animals must be properly cared for by exhibitor.
 5. Exhibitors are limited to two (2) entries in each youth class and open class (only 1 market lamb may be exhibited).
 6. Market lambs will be weighed in before the show between 8:30 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. Judging will begin at 10:00 a.m.
 7. Market lambs shall have wool covering of not more than one inch. The market lambs will be judged on the basis of best finish for that day. Market lambs can only be shown in the market lamb class and will not be allowed to enter a ewe lamb class with the same animal.
 8. Exhibitor's Flock animals must include at least a ram and ewe of any age.
 9. Sheep must remain on fairgrounds for public viewing from 10:00 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday. Sheep should be brought to the fairgrounds between 8:00 a.m. - 9:00 a.m. Sunday, July 24, 2016.
 10. A \$4 entry fee per class per animal will be charged for each sheep and goat entry.
- And goat entry. Fee must be paid at time of pre-registration.
11. First prize winners only can compete for champion prizes.
 12. The Sheep Open Class is open to any Menominee County resident who has reached the minimum age of 9 by January 1st, 2016.
 13. The exhibitor must furnish food and water unless told otherwise by the Superintendent.
 14. The goat show is open to any Menominee County resident. Exhibitors are limited to 2 entries per class.
 15. All sheep and goats must have USDA ID ear tag showing they have been tested for SCRAPIES

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RULES FOR HORSE AND PONY PULLING

1. Horse and Pony pulling contest will be held on Friday, July 22, 2016 at approximately 3:30 p.m. with weigh-in to begin at 2:00 p.m.
2. No mileage will be paid. Stone boat rules will govern contest for horse pull and pony pull.
3. No stimulated or drugged horses or ponies will be allowed to pull.
4. Each driver must take first pull after weight change, except on warm-up loads.
5. Each team will be driven by one driver throughout the entire contest, except in case of injury.
6. Any forward movement of load after driver gives command to go will be counted as a pull.
7. The weight of the load will be determined by the judges.
8. Three trials to each load. The driver must stay hooked for his second trial and return for the third trial. Third trial can be pulled either way.
9. There will not be over three tries to hitch or it will be counted as a pull.
10. If any horse steps on or over the ropes while pulling, the team will be disqualified for that given pull. This must be called by the judges.
11. No one horse will be allowed to pull in two classes.
12. Driver must be ready when his turn comes to pull.
13. If any team takes too long to get ready to pull, his pull can be taken away.
14. Any team declared unmanageable will be sent to the truck by the judges.
15. All pulling horses may be subject to a saliva and urine test by a state-licensed veterinarian.
16. Regulation No. 813: R235, 813.2 Drugs illegal to use. Rule 2 - It is illegal to administer, internally or externally, a drug of a nature that could affect or alter the normal performance of a horse in a harness race or an animal entered in a pulling contest where state funds are used for any portion of the premiums offered. **Rules that apply to Pony Pulling only:**
 - A. A \$5 entry fee is to be paid for each class at time of entry.
 - B. Classification of ponies will be 49" and under; and 49"- 53".
 - C. Pulling court will be 12 feet in width.
 - D. Ponies will be measured at the third vertebrae of the withers standing in a natural position; shoes will be deducted from the height of the pony.
 - E. Ponies will be measured by appointed committee of the fair at the fairgrounds.
 - F. Each driver will be allowed two helpers; one to be at the head, if desired; all other helpers and judges to stay behind eveners.
 - G. All ponies must pull in their own class.

Rules that apply to Horse Pulling only:

- A. An entry fee of \$10 for each class is to be paid at the time of entry.
- B. Split Overweight teams must be weighed between 2-3 p.m. CDT at the fairgrounds.
- C. The distance for each pull shall be 27-1/2 feet, but distance of less than 27-1/2 feet will be used to determine the winner of placement at the end of contest.

- E. Drivers shall not prod, whip or touch horses while pulling and shall drive with reasonably tight lines and in no case will a driver be allowed to whirl or shake lines over horses or above his own head while pulling. No driver will be allowed to jump doubletrees.
- F. Split Overweight must weigh under 4100 pounds and must be weighed without harness on the day of contest.



- Contest is open to anyone 18 years of age or older at the time of the contest.
- All tractors will be weighed in between 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. CDT Sunday, July 26, 2016 at the Fairgrounds at Shakey Lakes Park.
- An entry fee of \$20 per class plus \$5 per person fair admission at gate.
- Tractors shall not operate more than 15% over factory rated RPM's. Maximum and minimum speeds are to be determined by judges.
- Judges have the right to stop and/or disqualify any contestant if tractor is being operated in an unsafe manner and if any modifications are detected.
- Contestant must furnish own clevis.
- Only one pull allowed unless a tie is declared. Pull is ended when engine stalls or forward motion stops. No jerking or hole digging allowed.
- No one allowed on track except for officials and contestants; no helpers. Track is the area 24 feet in any direction of contest area boundaries.
- Contest open only for tractors rubber-tired with 2-wheel drive. No dual wheels or tire chains allowed. 4-wheel drive tractors can pull with 2 wheels engaged.
- Only one person allowed on tractor when pulling and that driver must remain seated while pulling. Weight includes driver; no changes allowed after weigh-in. All weights must be bolted to tractor either on the wheels, front-end or frame.

- Drawbars shall be standard factory equipment with a maximum height of 20 inches; must be stationary and extend beyond rear wheels. Drawbars will be checked and measured before tractor is allowed to pull.
- Tractors must be equipped with a hood and grill.
- No slipping of clutch permitted, downshifting permissible providing forward motion doesn't stop.
- If the superintendent believes any contestant to be a safety hazard because of the consumption of alcoholic beverages or drugs, the contestant shall be barred from the contest.
- All entries subject to above rules. If any question arises regarding rules or any other part of the contest, the decision of the superintendent shall be final.
- A tractor can only pull in two (2) classes.
Antique tractors must be 1938 to 1957 or older. Any tractor in question as to being 1938 or older must have the serial number in the proper place and must be read easily. Tractors must have stock blocks and no external parts manufactured for tractors built later than 1938. Any tractor that has a serial number or parts to make a newer tractor appear legal will be disqualified. Any tractor that has a serial number or parts to make a newer tractor appear legal will be disqualified. Engine speed must be controlled by throttle lever only. No strings, wires or foot feeds allowed. Any gas-operated tractor must use gasoline only. The decision of the track judges will be final on areas of dispute not covered in these rules. No tractors equipped with torque amplifier or converter or any "shift on the go" device will not be allowed to shift on the go. Tractor weights must not extend ahead of front wheels. Rear weights must not extend more than 24 inches behind the center of the rear axle. Weights must be securely fastened to the tractor. Weights must not interfere with the hook-up. If anything falls off tractor it will be disqualified. Judge's decision will be final regarding pull and/or equipment.




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

All cattle, goats, and bison of any age and reproductive capability, unless transported directly to a USDA inspected slaughter facility, must be identified with a USDA approved official identification ear tag, or official breed registration tattoo, prior to importation. An official breed registration tattoo may only be used if the animal is accompanied by the official breed registration certificate during the movement. The official identification must be recorded on the required official interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection. Dairy cattle, breeding cattle, feeder heifers, horses and other equidae, breeding swine, feeder swine, market hogs, llamas, alpacas, privately-owned cervids, aquaculture, and wild animals for exhibition originating outside the state of Michigan shall meet the requirements found at www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo or by contacting the fair exposition staff or livestock entry office.
