


1.0 INTRODUCTION

Nadeau Township, with the assistance of the Central Upper Peninsula Planning and Development (CUPPAD) Regional Commission, has put together this five year recreational plan. The purpose of this plan is to provide for development of recreational activities, programs, and facilities within the Township.


Nadeau Township is an 80 square mile or 51,200 acre parcel of land in the central portion of Menominee County, as shown on Map 1-1. The majority of the Township's population is concentrated in the Village of Carney and the community of Nadeau, which are only 1 ½ miles apart. These communities are about 28 miles southwest of the City of Escanaba and 35 miles north of the City of Menominee. Existing industries in Carney/Nadeau are operations primary based on timber resource and agriculture.

2.0 ADMINISTRATIVE STRUCTURE

Planning for and providing park and recreation services and open space for a community requires staff (or volunteers) and funds to purchase land and open spaces and to develop, operate and maintain them. This section describes how Nadeau Township's recreational functions are carried out.

The Township's current organizational structure is detailed in Figure 2-1.

Most of the responsibility for recreation lies with the Carney-Nadeau Public Schools system. A recreation committee was established by the Nadeau Township Board. The Recreation Committee is a 7-member committee that is made up of the following: local Catholic priest or a representative, local pastor, Carney Village President, two concerned citizens, Nadeau Township Trustee, and Carney-Nadeau Schools Superintendent. The Carney-Nadeau School Board President was also instrumental in the development of the current plan.

During the development of this plan update, the Recreation Committee solicited comments from local service clubs, associations, baseball and softball organizations and other residents interested in Township recreation opportunities. The Committee members used these comments as the main ingredient for making recommendations as to how they believe the Township ought to be spending recreation dollars in the years ahead. These ideas were then formulated into a five year recreation development schedule.

The plan is designed to provide a long-range plan for development of recreational activities and programs in the Council.

2.1 Staff

The Carney-Nadeau School System's recreation sites are maintained by school employees, while the Township owned recreation sites are maintained by citizen volunteers. Decisions on specific issues about the recreation sites; maintenance, development items, etc., requires approval from both the Township and School Board. The Township cemetery sextons currently mow the lawns at the Township owned facilities.

2.2 Budget

Projected Annual Budgets

Nadeau Township allocates roughly \$1,500.00 per year for recreation, while the Carney-Nadeau Public Schools does not specifically allocate monies for recreation.

Funding Sources

The funding source for recreation in the Township is the Township's general fund.

2.3 Volunteer Organizations/Relationship with School District

The Township may seek assistance from local volunteer organizations or the school district for recreation area development in the future. The Township could also partner with the Village of Carney recreation development due to the close proximity of the two communities. The Township Fire Department currently assists the Township by maintaining the ice rink in Nadeau.

The Township has a cooperative relationship with the Carney-Nadeau Public Schools system. The School Board also passes a resolution adopting the Recreation Plan.

3.0 RECREATION INVENTORY

From a recreational standpoint, it is important the Township provides a broad range of recreational opportunities to local citizens, as well as tourists. An inventory of existing recreation facilities in the Township is included in Table 3-1.

In addition, an inventory of the nearby recreation sites not located within Township limits but most likely utilized by Township residents is provided at the end of this section.

3.1 Township Recreation Facilities

Nadeau Township and Carney-Nadeau Schools have a total of eight recreation facilities including those that are associated with privately owned entities (open for public use). These recreation sites accommodate a variety of opportunities for a wide spectrum of recreational pursuits, for the Township's residents.

In fall 2010, an inventory of existing public recreational areas and facilities within the Nadeau Township was updated with the assistance of Township and School officials. The update of the inventory is shown in detail on the following pages in Table 3-1. Map 3-1 shows the location of each facility. The Township and School District owned facilities were evaluated for accessibility. The facilities are in need of updates to improve the accessibility for all users; accessibility improvements are included as objectives in this plan. The following rating scale was used:

- 1 = none of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines
- 2 = some of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines
- 3 = most of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines
- 4 = the entire park meets accessibility guidelines
- 5 = the entire park was developed/renovated using the principals of universal design

In addition, an inventory of the nearby recreation sites not located within Township limits but most likely utilized by Township residents is provided at the end of this section.

4.0 DESCRIPTION OF PLANNING AND PUBLIC INPUT PROCESS

4.1 Planning Data

Population

For any planning endeavor, careful attention must be given to the analysis of population trends and projections. Such an analysis is necessary to determine existing or future needs based on characteristics of the area's population. Population analysis helps determine the direction for local capital improvements and related expenditures. The growth pattern of the Nadeau Township has been a general pattern of decline from 1950 to 2000, with the decline slowing from 1990 to 2000. The Census Bureau population estimate for 2009 is 1,133 persons in the Township. It is expected future population of the Township may continue to decline slightly.

Age Characteristics

The median age reported in 2000 of the Township is 39.5, slightly lower when compared to the Menominee County median age of 40.4.

About 7 percent of the Township is pre-school age; about 21 percent of the Township is made up of school-age children, while the vast majority (about 57 percent) of the Township consists of the working age population. About 15 percent of the population is made up of the retirement population. Age groups are broken down further in Table 4-2.



Gender

The population of the Township in 2000 by sex indicates that there were 578 males in the Township and 582 females. The Township is 50.9 percent female, and 49.1 percent male.

Economic Characteristics

The economy of Nadeau Township currently, as in the past, is principally natural resource based, with forest products and agriculture being the dominant industries. The majority of the economic activities in the Township occur in the Village of Carney. This Village is the site of the following major employers within the Township: Superior Cedar Products Inc., Carney-Nadeau Public Schools, Upper Peninsula Phone, Hotflame Gas Inc., Performance Lumber and Nadeau Township.

In 1999, the per capita income for Nadeau Township was \$15,983, which was lower than the per capita income of the County and the State (Table 4-3). All three of these areas showed an increase in per capita income from 1989 after adjusting for inflation. The Township's income level increased by \$4,172; or 26.1 percent during this ten year period.

Area Physical Characteristics

The Little Cedar River is the only major water feature within Nadeau Township. It flows in the western portion of the Township.

The Township's topography is mostly rolling, with the hilliest areas east of the community of Nadeau and the Village of Carney. The highest elevation within the Township is about 900 feet.

Nadeau Township is dominated by loamy soils with associated organic soils on the uplands. The dominant soil association is the Onaway-Angelica. As a group, these soils contain some of the finest agricultural soils in the U.P. Halfway between Carney and Nadeau there are good intrusions of the Kiva Soil Association; also a good soil for agriculture purposes. This association is characterized by loamy soils underlain by sand and gravel. This association continues south through the Township along US-41.

Local Transportation System

US-41 is the major thoroughfare through Nadeau Township. It links the Township to the City of Menominee to the south, the City of Escanaba to the northeast, and the City of Iron Mountain to the northwest (via US-41). This north/south highway corridor is important for hauling raw materials and finished products by truck for businesses in the U.P. and northeastern Wisconsin. It also serves as the main commuting route for Township residents that work in Menominee, Escanaba, or Iron Mountain (via US-2). In recent years, this corridor and the main east-west County Road 374 have become important recreational arteries in that County Road 374 connects US-41 and Highway M-35, which is the site of a recently constructed marina on Green Bay. Traveling west from the Village of Carney, on the same road, leads to Miskauno Island, an increasingly important recreational facility located just west of the Michigan-Wisconsin border. The Chip-In Casino, located on US-41 between Nadeau Township and the City of Escanaba, is also a heavy draw of traffic upon this north-south corridor.

The Township's road network is broken down into county primary and local. Two important county primary roads within the Township are County Roads 380 and 374.

4.2 Planning Methods/Systems Approach to Planning

The systems approach to planning incorporates information gained from citizen surveys and detailed recreation inventories to determine the recreation needs of a community.

The Public Input Process

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources requires that two methods be used to incorporate public input into the recreation planning process. The Recreation Committee requested input on recreation needs in the Township by from local clubs and service groups as well as at various Nadeau Township Board meetings. Minutes and agendas are included in Appendix B. Recreation improvements are also discussed at Carney-Nadeau School Board meetings. A summary of the public input that had been received during the draft process was reviewed at the February 14th, 2011 Township Board meeting; a copy of the agenda and minutes are included in Appendix B. The plan was available for comment by Township residents at the Carney-Nadeau School, beginning on February 11th, 2011, with a notice placed at the Township Hall, at the Carney-Nadeau Public Schools and at various locations throughout the Township; the notice is included in Appendix B. The Township Board adopted the plan on March 14th, 2011 and the Carney-Nadeau School Board adopted the plan on March 21st, 2011.

5.0 GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Objectives are guides for recreation related decision-making. Consideration of the recreational policies should lead the community toward the attainment of its goals. Specific development of projects and programs should be evaluated with respect to the recreational goals and objectives. The following goals and objectives should serve as guidelines toward development strategies.

Goal I: Provide a wide variety of recreational opportunities to all residents and visitors of Nadeau Township.

Objectives:

- Projects should be easily accessible to all residents and visitors.
- Projects should strive to meet and exceed all ADA standards.
- Whenever, or wherever possible, facilities should be developed for multiple and/or year-round use.
- Proposed projects should eliminate identified recreational deficiencies.
- Make maximum use of state and federal assistance programs to acquire and develop recreation areas and facilities.

Goal II: Make maximum use of the recreational opportunities offered by the area's natural environment.

Objectives:

- Facilities should be designed to compliment and preserve the surrounding natural quality of the area.
- Whenever possible, the Township, Carney-Nadeau Public School District and private interests should coordinate the development of recreation facilities and programs.
- Existing facilities should be upgraded before new ones are built.
- Proper maintenance should be ensured for all facilities.
- The Township, Carney-Nadeau Public School District and concerned organizations and individuals should develop programs and incorporate designs to reduce vandalism.

5.1 Identified Recreational Needs

The specific recreation facility needs should be based on the expressed desires of the residents of Nadeau Township. The following types of facility needs have been expressed for the community:

- **Nadeau Township Community Trail System:** The Township currently has many citizens that walk, run or bike on a daily basis. The majority of these citizens must travel on the road system. The greater number of residents using the road system for these activities causes a large increase in the likelihood of conflicts between pedestrians and motorists. The School District is also participating in the Safe Routes to School program, which promotes students walking or riding their bicycles to school in a safe manner.

A three-quarter mile paved trail system along the perimeter of the school property in

conjunction with a 3.5 mile cross country trail would enable individuals to walk, run and bike in a safe environment. Besides walkers and runners, the trail system would be used for biking, rollerblading and skateboarding. During the winter months, it would be converted for cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. The School District would use the trail system for physical education and sporting practices.

- **Picnic Area:** Currently, there are no well-maintained picnic areas in the vicinity of the Village of Carney. The area adjacent to the baseball field would be developed to include picnic tables and a pavilion with landscaping. This would provide the community residents a place for picnics, reunions and other social gatherings.
- **Restroom Facility:** The construction of outdoor restrooms in close proximity to the recreation facilities (basketball/tennis court, track, ballfield and proposed picnic/pavilion area) on the school property would benefit residents and visitors. These restrooms would be readily available, as the school restrooms are inaccessible when the school building is locked.
- **School Playground:** The playground at the Carney-Nadeau Schools is in need of major upgrades. The playground base is in need of demolition and needs to be resurfaced with superior materials. The playground equipment is also outdated and in need of replacement.

5.2 Recreation Development Schedule

Every plan should, ideally, result in action. Clearly, this cannot always be the case. Every effort should be made, however, to attain this general result. To this end, the Township Board, with assistance from the Recreation Committee and School District has formulated the following recreation development program for implementing the recreation plan. This development schedule will be followed as nearly as possible by the Township. In addition, since this plan, in its entirety, is adopted by Township Board and School Board resolutions, the Boards understand that changes must also be made by resolution if conditions change.





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MAP 2-1 Nadeau Township Location





MAP 4-1 Nadeau Township Land Use







MAP 6-1 Nadeau Township Recreation Facilities





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

Sheriff Marks advised that they had tried to get the Road Patrol millage on the ballot last year, but it was denied by the County Board. It is now scheduled for the May 3, 2011 election. For the department to prepare properly for next year's budget they need to have in an idea of how much revenue they will be working with.

If the new millage does not go thru, the closeout cost associated with the current millage will not make it to the summer of 2012. The new millage will begin December of 2012 when the current millage in place will be completed.

The 24 hour language is in the millage request which means there will be two officers on duty 24 hours per day.

Last year there was a shortfall to the program of \$713,000 in which the County kicked in \$130,000 to \$170,000. The general fund supplied the rest. There are two positions that are not funded and no funding for a vehicle if one is needed to be replaced. Sheriff Marks noted that they need approximately \$900,000 per year to run the 24 Hour Road Patrol Program.

Since the 24 Hour Road Patrol began (1994) there have been two positions eliminated in the last ten years. There are two cars and 10 deputies. The increase in millage from 1.5 to 1.795 will generate the shortfall that the General Fund is now covering. This will be a six year millage.

Sheriff Marks noted that without the millage they will not be a 24 Hour Road Patrol and he advised that the State of Michigan is going to retire 190 troopers this year and close some departments.






